Mission to Rodrigues

A delegation comprising Miss Nusrah Emamally, Board Member, Mr Jocelin Niven, Academic Coordinator, and Mrs Edina Ragudu, Secretary of the Trust Fund for Excellence in Sports proceeded on mission to Rodrigues from 4 to 7 November 2020. The main purpose of the visit was to ensure that TFES programmes in Rodrigues were running smoothly.

The delegation paid a courtesy visit to Mrs Marie Rose de Lima Edouard-Ravina, the Commissioner of Sports, Youth, Community Development, Library Services, Archives & Museum on 6 November 2020.

She expressed her satisfaction and thanked the TFES for the amazing work that was being achieved in favour of the promising athletes of Rodrigues.





A workshop was conducted with the representatives of the Regional Sports Committees where the TFES programmes were presented.

Site visits were also carried out to ensure that athletes on the TFES programmes were being trained in good conditions.

Horizon Paris 2024

Project Horizon Paris 2024 was set up in 2019. Its objective is to support, follow and prepare the Mauritian athletes for the Olympic Games 2024 in Paris.

The criteria to be met by elite athletes in order to form part of the project are as follows:

- (i) should have the potential to be a medallist:
- (ii) should have been an African medallist or is ranked among the Top 15 in the world; and
- (iii) should have the appropriate technical backup to meet the objectives set.

Types of support provided to athletes under the programme during the financial year 2020 - 2021:

- (i) medical / paramedical assistance;
- (ii) DNA tests for the athletes to assess their physical abilities in order to elaborate appropriate training plans and to use the correct training methods;
- (iii) blood tests for the athletes;
- (iv) mental preparation for all the athletes;
- (v) provision of technical equipment to athletes; and
- (vi) allowances to athletes.

State Recognition Allowance Scheme for Retired Athletes

The State Recognition Allowance Scheme for Retired Athletes (SRASRA) was launched in October 2017. One hundred and ten retired athletes were on the first list of beneficiaries. The objective of the SRASRA is to recognize the effort of athletes who have represented Mauritius and won medals in specific competitions. Assistance is provided to them by way of the provision of an allowance after their retirement from high level competitions. During the financial year 2020-2021, one hundred and twenty-three retired (123) athletes were beneficiaries under the scheme.





General information

1. The Fund

Accounting Policies

Corporate information

Trust Fund for Excellence in Sports, (the "Fund") was established on 01 August 2002 under the aegis of the Ministry of Youth and Sports to serve and finance specific projects in sports.

1. Significant accounting policies

The principal accounting policies applied in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below.

1.1 Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on the going concern basis in accordance with, and in compliance with, International Financial Reporting Standards ("IFRS") and International Financial Reporting Interpretations Committee ("IFRIC") interpretations issued and effective at the time of preparing these financial statements.

The financial statements have been prepared on the historic cost convention, unless otherwise stated in the accounting policies which follow and incorporate the principal accounting policies set out below. They are presented in Mauritius Rupees ("MUR"), which is the Fund's functional currency.

These accounting policies are consistent with the previous period.

1.2 Intangible assets

An intangible asset is recognised when:

- · it is probable that the expected future economic benefits that are attributable to the asset will flow to the entity; and
- the cost of the asset can be measured reliably.

Intangible assets are carried at cost less any accumulated amortisation and any impairment losses.

The amortisation period and the amortisation method for intangible assets are reviewed every period-end.

1.3 Property, plant and equipment

Property, plant and equipment is subsequently stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses. except for land which is stated at cost less any accumulated impairment losses.

Depreciation is calculated on the straight-line method to write off the cost of assets or the valued amounts, to their residual values over their estimated useful life.

The residual value, useful life and depreciation method of each asset are reviewed at the end of each reporting year. If the expectations differ from previous estimates, the change is accounted for prospectively as a change in accounting estimate.

Each part of an item of property, plant and equipment with a cost that is significant in relation to the total cost of the item is depreciated separately.

The depreciation charge for each year is recognised in profit or loss unless it is included in the carrying amount of another asset.

Impairment tests are performed on property, plant and equipment when there is an indicator that they may be impaired. When the carrying amount of an item of property, plant and equipment is assessed to be higher than the estimated recoverable amount, an impairment loss is recognised immediately in profit or loss to bring the carrying amount in line with the recoverable amount.

Accounting Policies

1.3 Property, plant and equipment (continued)

An item of property, plant and equipment is derecognised upon disposal or when no future economic benefits are expected from its continued use or disposal. Any gain or loss arising from the derecognition of an item of property, plant and equipment, determined as the difference between the net disposal proceeds, if any, and the carrying amount of the item, is included in profit or loss when the item is derecognised.

1.4 Impairment of assets

The Fund assesses at each end of the reporting period whether there is any indication that an asset may be impaired. If any such indication exists, the Fund estimates the recoverable amount of the asset.

If the recoverable amount of an asset is less than its carrying amount, the carrying amount of the asset is reduced to its recoverable amount. That reduction is an impairment loss.

An impairment loss of assets carried at cost less any accumulated depreciation or amortisation is recognised immediately in profit or loss. Any impairment loss of a revalued asset is treated as a revaluation decrease.

The increased carrying amount of an asset other than goodwill attributable to a reversal of an impairment loss does not exceed the carrying amount that would have been determined had no impairment loss been recognised for the asset in prior periods.

A reversal of an impairment loss of assets carried at cost less accumulated depreciation or amortisation other than goodwill is recognised immediately in profit or loss. Any reversal of an impairment loss of a revalued asset is treated as a revaluation increase.

1.5 Financial instruments

Financial instruments held by the Fund are classified in accordance with the provisions of IFRS 9 Financial Instruments.

Broadly, the classification possibilities, which are adopted by the Fund, as applicable, are as follows:

Financial assets which are debt instruments:

Amortised cost. (This category applies only when the contractual terms of the instrument give rise, on specified
dates, to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on principal, and where the instrument is held
under a business model whose objective is met by holding the instrument to collect contractual cash flows)

Financial liabilities:

Amortised cost

Other receivables

Classification

Other receivables, excluding prepayments, are classified as financial assets subsequently measured at amortised cost (note 10).

They have been classified in this manner because their contractual terms give rise, on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal outstanding, and the Fund's business model is to collect the contractual cash flows on other receivables.

Recognition and measurement

Other receivables are recognised when the Fund becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the receivables. They are measured, at initial recognition, at fair value plus transaction costs, if any.

They are subsequently measured at amortised cost.

The amortised cost is the amount recognised on the receivable initially, minus principal repayments, plus cumulative amortisation (interest) using the effective interest method of any difference between the initial amount and the maturity amount, adjusted for any loss allowance.

Accounting Policies

1.5 Financial instruments (continued)

Impairment

The Fund recognises a loss allowance for expected credit losses on other receivables, excluding prepayments. The amount of expected credit losses is updated at each reporting date.

The Fund measures the loss allowance for other receivables at an amount equal to lifetime expected credit losses (lifetime ECL), which represents the expected credit losses that will result from all possible default events over the expected life of the receivable.

Other payables

Classification

Other payables (note 11), excluding amounts received in advance, are classified as financial liabilities subsequently measured at amortised cost.

Recognition and measurement

They are recognised when the Fund becomes a party to the contractual provisions, and are measured, at initial recognition, at fair value plus transaction costs, if any.

They are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents are stated at carrying amount which is deemed to be fair value.

Derecognition

Financial assets

The Fund derecognises a financial asset only when the contractual rights to the cash flows from the asset expire, or when it transfers the financial asset and substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of the asset to another party. If the Fund neither transfers nor retains substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership and continues to control the transferred asset, the Fund recognises its retained interest in the asset and an associated liability for amounts it may have to pay. If the Fund retains substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of a transferred financial asset, the Fund continues to recognise the financial asset and also recognises a collateralised borrowing for the proceeds received.

Financial liabilities

The Fund derecognises financial liabilities when, and only when, the Fund obligations are discharged, cancelled or they expire. The difference between the carrying amount of the financial liability derecognised and the consideration paid and payable, including any non-cash assets transferred or liabilities assumed, is recognised in profit or loss.

Reclassification

Financial assets

The Fund only reclassifies affected financial assets if there is a change in the business model for managing financial assets. If a reclassification is necessary, it is applied prospectively from the reclassification date. Any previously stated gains, losses or interest are not restated.

The reclassification date is the beginning of the first reporting period following the change in business model which necessitates a reclassification.

Financial liabilities

Financial liabilities are not reclassified.

Accounting Policies

1.6 Surplus / deficiency

- Any surplus money (standing to credit) of the Fund is invested in such manner as the Committee of the Fund may
 decide with the approval of the Minister.
- · The Fund is not authorised to incur expenditure in excess of the balance of the Fund.

1.7 Winding up

In the event of a winding up of the Fund, the net assets of the Fund shall accrue to the Consolidated Fund.

1.8 Employee benefits

Employee benefits are recognised over the working life of each employee. The Fund does not operate any defined benefit pension scheme.

1.9 Income

The income of the Fund consists of donations, grants, sponsorships and interest on bank deposits.

Income is recognised on the following basis:

- (i) donations, grants, sponsorship and CSR income are recognised on a receipt basis.
- (ii) interest income is recognised on an accrual basis unless collectibility is in doubt.

1.10 Expense recognition

All expenses are accounted for in profit or loss on an accrual basis.

1.11 Grants in aid

Grants in aid payable to sportsmen and sportswomen are accounted for on an accrual basis.

1.12 Provisions and contingencies

Provisions are recognised when:

- the Fund has a present obligation as a result of a past event;
- · it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation; and
- a reliable estimate can be made of the obligation.

The amount of a provision is the present value of the expenditure expected to be required to settle the obligation.

Where some or all of the expenditure required to settle a provision is expected to be reimbursed by another party, the reimbursement shall be recognised when, and only when, it is virtually certain that reimbursement will be received if the entity settles the obligation. The reimbursement shall be treated as a separate asset. The amount recognised for the reimbursement shall not exceed the amount of the provision.

Provisions are not recognised for future operating losses.

1.13 Related parties

Related parties are individuals or entities where the individuals or entities have the ability, directly or indirectly to control the other party or exercise significant influence over the party in making financial or operating decisions, or vice versa, or where the Fund is subject to common control or common significant influence. Related parties may be individuals or other entities.

Accounting Policies

1.14 Significant judgements and sources of estimation uncertainty

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with IFRS requires management, from time to time, to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of policies and reported amounts of assets, liabilities, income and expenses. These estimates and associated assumptions are based on experience and various other factors that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances. Actual results may differ from these estimates. The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimates are revised and in any future periods affected.

Critical judgements in applying accounting policies

The critical judgements made by management in applying accounting policies, apart from those involving estimations, that have the most significant effect on the amounts recognised in the financial statements, are outlined as follows:

Determination of functional currency

The determination of the functional currency of the Fund is critical since recording of transactions and exchange differences arising thereon are dependent on the functional currency selected. The directors have considered those factors described therein and have determined that the functional currency of the Fund is the Mauritius Rupee ("MUR").

Estimate of useful lives and residual value

The depreciation and amortisation charge calculation require an estimate of the economic useful lives of the respective assets. The Fund uses historical experience and comparable market available data to determine useful lives.

Liquidity risk

The Fund is exposed to liquidity risk, which is the risk that the Fund will encounter difficulties in meeting its obligations as they become due.

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Fund will not be able to meet its financial obligations as they fall due. The Fund's approach to managing liquidity is to ensure, as far as possible, that it will always have sufficient liquidity to meet its liabilities when due, under both normal and stressed conditions, without incurring unacceptable losses or risking damage to the Fund's reputation.

The Fund manages liquidity risk by continuously monitoring forecasts and actual cashflows and matching the maturity profiles of the financial liabilities.
